An Update from the Board Chair

Key Accomplishments:

- Received an independent Auditor's Report with an opinion stating: *"in all material respects, the financial position of The Samaritan House of Orangeburg County, Incorporated as of December 31, 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America."*
- Residents served: **75 men 55 women 41 children**
- Served an average of 500 meals per month to community residents facing food insecurity
- Hired 2 former residents as employees at The Samaritan House
- Received a legislative/earmark award of \$450,000 sponsored by Senator Brad Hutto for roof replacement and shelter improvement
- Received a \$50,000 grant from the City of Orangeburg to paint the exterior of the building, the retaining wall, the storage building, and to resurface the driveway
- Replaced the outside yard sign
- Replaced commodes and sinks on the male and female corridors (donated by Lowe's of Orangeburg)
- Received ServSafe certification by the National Restaurant Association for the Executive Director and two dieticians
- Executive Director graduated from Carolina Leadership Training
- Held Board and staff retreat and in-service training
- Received a one-year grant from United Way for fundraising software (Network for Good)

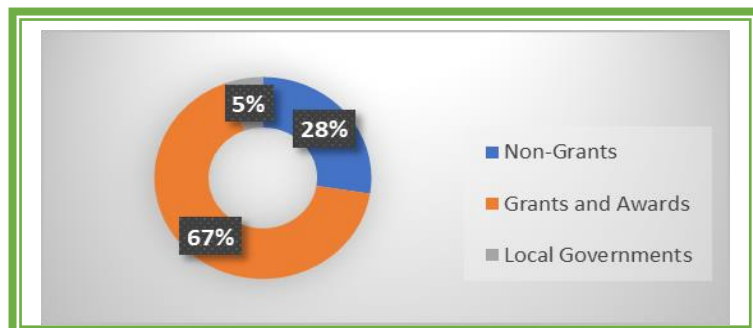

The Samaritan House Programs

Housing, Programs, and Residents

Emergency Housing

An individual may stay in an emergency bed for 90-120 days. During that time, they receive all services and meals. By the end of the timeframe, the resident must decide if they are ready to move towards getting their life on track.

Stabilization Program

Residents are committed and cooperate in the development of an Individualized Case Plan which will move them towards independence and self-sufficiency.

Extended Program

Residents showed considerable progress in working towards independence but required additional support to address specific barriers to self-sufficiency.

Rapid Re-Housing Program

This program provided funds (when available) for housing relocation and stabilization services. These funds helped a homeless individual or family move as quickly as possible into permanent housing and achieve stability.

Services Offered

TSH offered the following services on-site and through referrals:

- Educational Assistance
- Workforce Development
- Job Placement Counseling
- Mental Health Assistance
- Substance Abuse Assistance
- Counseling (individual and group)
- Housing Assistance
- Health Care Counseling
- Financial Literacy
- Financial Referral Assistance
- SNAP Referral Assistance
- Mentoring
- Spiritual Enrichment
- Motivational Workshops
- Legal Services
- Rapid Re-housing Services
- COVID Testing

TSH also provided:

- Three (3) nutritious meals per day
- Computer Room
- Laundry Facilities
- Transportation to appointments and providers
- Personal care items
- Transitional items as residents moved into permanent homes
- Medication assistance (when available)

Demographics of Residents

During the calendar year 2022, TSH housed a total of 171 homeless individuals. These included 75 men, 55 women, and 41 children.

Some of the residents experienced: mental health issues, drug and/or alcohol abuse, chronic health conditions, and developmental and physical disabilities.

TSH served individuals from South Carolina, North Carolina, Georgia, Virginia, Ohio, and other states.

The Samaritan House Program Results

In accordance with the McKinney-Vento Act, school aged children at TSH are enrolled in the Orangeburg County Public School System.

Shelter residents participated in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) through Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College. The program is designed for SNAP recipients to learn job skills.

TSH is the only temporary housing shelter in the tri-county area of Orangeburg, Calhoun, and Bamberg Counties.

Housing, Programs, and Residents (continued)

Several residents received job training and job placement services through the South Carolina Vocational Rehabilitation program in Orangeburg.

Financial Stability for Residents

A few residents came to TSH with some existing financial benefits

Several residents secured job placements at Allied Air, Cracker Barrel, TRMC, Orangeburg County School District, Staffmark, Broughton Street Café, & Ice Cream, McDonald's, Shoney's, Vocational Rehab, Chick-fil-A, Sodexo Zaxby's, Husqvarna, and several local hotels, to include "day jobs" with individuals looking for day laborers.

Two (2) former residents at TSH were hired as Resident Assistants working evenings and weekends.

Medical Care

All residents who did not have a medical home were assisted with finding medical coverage or medical care during their stay at TSH.

Self-Sufficiency

TSH has a goal of self-sufficiency and independent living for its residents. The Shelter Case

Manager and Intake Coordinator generate and use each resident's Individualized Case Plan to monitor progress. Completing the training programs and complying with various aspects of the plan are essential components of achieving progress.

Ultimate success is measured through the resident's obtaining income and moving out of the shelter into safe, affordable, and stable housing.

Giving Back

So often at TSH, an abundance of personal hygiene products and food donations are received. Gift bags are given to residents relocating and to individuals in the community.

TSH has an on-site vegetable garden which supplies fresh vegetables for the residents. Some of the vegetables are donated to Jamison's Pharmacy in Orangeburg, South Carolina for their Community Basket. Vegetables are also provided to other people in the community who come to see the garden.

Spiritual and Community Enrichment

On-site enrichment sessions and meals:

- the second Mondays, Sisters of the Holy Cross
- the fourth Thursdays, Mt. Calvary Baptist Church
- fourth Saturdays, Kingdom Life Men Ministry
